Our trails are meeting places for the healthy rebuilding of our community. The by-law and the new patrol program are tools we are giving ourselves to preserve this value.

The summer will give us the first chance to determine how these new steps will improve coexistence. We will continue to listen and make necessary adjustments.

Hiking Trails for all



The Town of Brome Lake has 20 kilometers of hiking trails that welcome hikers, cyclists, runners, skiers, families, and others on a daily basis. To preserve this shared resource and ensure a pleasant experience for all, at its May 4th meeting Council adopted By-law 2026-09 which deals with public trails.

This new by-law is based on a fundamental principle: harmonious coexistence. It regulates systems of transportation, establishes a speed limit of 20 kilometers per hour, and sets out rules of safety and courtesy, notably about traffic direction and pedestrian crossings. Walkers and cyclists will be required to keep to the right, and passing will be done on the left. These guidelines seek to ensure safe practices for all users, including those who are walking with a pet.

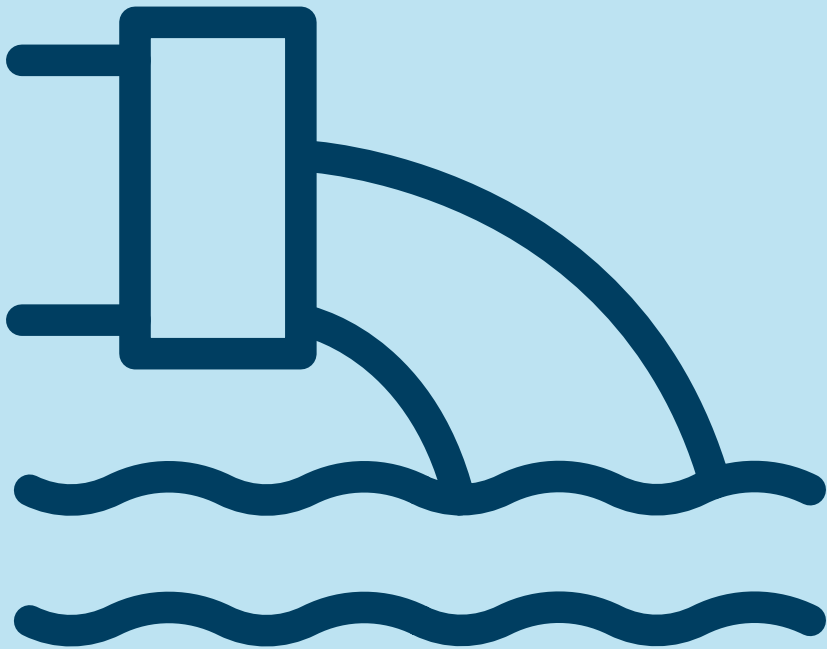
To support this transition, the Town will inaugurate a bicycle patrol program this summer. These volunteer ambassadors will encourage compliance and will act as friendly guides. A sensitization campaign will complete these efforts, reminding everyone of the importance of mutual respect on our trails.

Actions Taken

on the Two Major Breaks in the Sewer System



During the past months, two separate events affected the sewer system in the Bondville sector. In order to demonstrate full transparency, the Town of Brome Lake wishes to inform its citizens of the circumstances and the impact of these occurrences, as well as the action taken to reduce the risk of such events in the future.

Two events and their effect on the network

In November 2025, a major break in the system occurred inside the pumping station at 460 Bondville Street. This is the station that pumps sewer water to the aeration ponds. This break caused flooding of the installation and the closure of three of the other stations in the system in order to control the water and to allow the workers to access the sites of the breaks situated approximately 6 meters deep in the station that was completely flooded.

The Intervention was carried out over 24 hours and allowed a re-establishment of the system's functionality. However, sewer water leaked into the environment and two residences were affected, notably because of backflow valves that did not work.

In March 2026, a second major event occurred when a sewer pipe collapsed on Bondville Street, near the intersection of Harvey Street. This situation caused a back-up of sewer water and a collapse of the roadway, requiring emergency work. The street had to be closed for a few days in order to repair the pipes on an emergency basis and to secure the sector. Once again, flooding took place above the affected area and certain properties suffered external damage.

Observations and steps taken

These two different events can be explained by the aging of certain infrastructure, the requirement for continuous use of mechanical equipment, and water flow in the network that is sometimes heavy. This did allow us see the need for certain necessary improvements, required to strengthen the adaptability of the system.

In both cases, the municipality intervened quickly in order to secure the areas, limit the impact, and reestablish service in the shortest possible time. Corrective measures were immediately taken and concrete action is already in place to improve the situation on a medium and long-term basis. An environmental follow up at the affected areas has also been conducted by the Town.

The Town has also undertaken a study on the modernization of its pumping stations and has proceeded with the replacement of certain aging infrastructure and is also relying on preventative maintenance practices to limit emergency situations. Additional inspections of the network are being carried out in order to better target the areas at risk and to check the state of the pipes to detect areas of infiltration that could overload the system.

The Town of Brome Lake is fully aware of the impact that such events can have on the citizens and the environment. The Town reiterates its undertaking to improve the reliability of the infrastructure and to make the necessary investments to provide safe, durable services.

Citizens also have a role to play in the prevention of this type of situation. It is recommended that backflow valves be fully functional in all residences and that any abnormal situation be brought to the attention of the municipal services.

Everyone's cooperation can contribute to strengthening the safety and performance of the municipal network.

Water quality

A new protocol on overflows

The Town is aware that overflows of sewage water into the lake can have a serious impact on health. In order to better follow the dispersal of contaminants and to document their effect, a sampling programme of surface water has been put into place after the overflow that took place last March.

This protocol will allow us to compare certain parameters against their usual values in order to observe the dispersal of any contaminants (extent, direction and speed) and to inform the users of the lake in the case of contamination so that they can avoid swimming and nautical activities near the affected areas.

A reminder: sewer water contains contaminants from residences, institutions, businesses and Industries that are connected to the network. Therefore, when an overflow occurs, citizens are asked to use the least water possible and to avoid the use of soaps, detergents and other chemical products. This simple act will allow us to reduce the quantity of water spilled and to improve its quality.

Preserving Douglass Beach

Each summer, the lawns at Douglass Beach become a meeting place for Canada Geese who come to feed and to rest. While wildlife is an integral part of the beauty of our region, this heavy concentration of birds poses important challenges. The accumulation of bird feces affects the quality of the natural environment and of the swimming area and gives rise to legitimate safety and health concerns.

To ensure a clean and pleasant environment, the municipal administration established a number of eco-sensitive, dissuasive measures that do not endanger the birds. On the site, a net sets out the limits of the lawn area. Kites shaped like predators will be added to this (relying on the geese's natural instinct to flee). In addition, flashing lights will be used to stop the birds from nesting at night.

In order for this plan to succeed, however, we will need everyone's participation. When you visit the beach, we ask you to use the access gates along the net exclusively, to close the gate each time, and to respect the fragility of this equipment. It is very important not to feed the birds. Citizen cooperation is essential to preserve the value of this local recreational gem.

Major Work on Fulford Road From June to October

The Town of Brome Lake will proceed with a complete reconstruction of Fulford Road on its entire 7.5 km. This major work represents an investment of close to \$7 million and will also include the construction of cycling lanes on both sides of the road to improve safety and promote physical activity.

The project will benefit from \$1.8 million in financial support from the Government of Quebec, paid under the program for assistance with local roadways (PAVL). An additional contribution of \$369,000 dollars from the gasoline tax program and a further contribution from Quebec (TECQ) will reduce the total cost for the Town.



The work will involve crushing the existing road surface and reusing of the materials thus produced, followed by adding a layer of gravel and new coats of paving. The roadway will also be widened to allow the addition of cycling lanes in accordance with existing regulations. In certain areas, the road surface will be widened within the existing right of way of the Town. Ditches and culverts will be adjusted accordingly.

The work will take place from June to October and will be carried out in two phases:

Phase 1

From Bondville Road to Davis Road

Phase 2

From Davis Road to Brome Road

Fulford Road will be closed to traffic during the work except for local traffic (residents and access to properties). Detours will be set up and clearly indicated to assist users during each phase of the work.



Open Air Fires

The burning of branches or other material in the open air outside of an acceptable fireplace requires a permit.

Such a permit must be requested by filling in the online form at least 48 hours in advance. Requests are handled Monday to Friday during office hours.

Once the permit has been issued certain requirements must be always followed:

- 1** The fire must be supervised by an adult until it is completely extinguished.
- 2** It is equally essential to have on hand the necessary equipment to extinguish the fire, should the need arise.

Please note that a permit can be revoked at any time if certain conditions occur, such as a change in the SOPFEU risk level.

Changes to Shoreline Work

On March 1st, the provincial government adopted a new set of rules regulating work on floodplains and shorelines. Like all other municipalities in Quebec, the Town of Brome Lake must comply.

The new rules regulate activities under the responsibility of municipalities that are performed in wetlands, and on work to protect against floods (RMun), and replaces the provisions in existence for the last 20 years. These new regulations seek to better reduce risks relating to floods and to reinforce protection of wetlands.

The changes also include stricter requirements, in particular regarding construction on floodplains and shorelines. The Town's Zoning By-law 596 remains in effect and will continue to apply in addition to the provincial requirements.

What this means for you

Any project situated near a body of water, a lake, or wetlands, or on the floodplain, whether it be to enlarge or modify a building, to work on a shoreline, to backfill or refill, or to install some form of infrastructure such as a dock or a fence, requires a municipal permit. In certain cases, a ministerial authorization may also be required.

Prior to starting any project, we invite you to contact the Town Urban Planning department. This will ensure that your project complies with the applicable municipal and provincial regulations.

Fiscal Year 2025

The Town of Brome Lake Shows a Surplus of

\$2,464,000

At the close of the 2025 fiscal year, the Town of Brome Lake showed a surplus of \$2,464,000. This surplus is explained mainly by the strength of the real estate market which generated additional revenues of \$1.7 million in transfer taxes and \$375,000 in real estate taxes. A savings of \$286,000 in the payroll account also contributed to this result.

As of December 31, 2025, the Town had an unaffected surplus of \$4.5 million and an affected surplus of \$5.5 million, reserved for specific projects such as road maintenance, the revitalization of the Town Centre, the new fire hall project, and the exercise of preemption rights.

As a reminder, the Municipal Council adopted a policy to manage long-term debt and accumulated surplus. In 2025, the Town followed the two ratios established in this policy.

Debt replacement represents 8.1% of operating expenses, well below the maximum established at 16%. In addition, the debt chargeable to taxpayers corresponds to 0.5% of the municipal evaluation, while the limit is set at 1.5%.


